

Term 3 is always a busy term for staff and students. Year 9 students have completed OLNA testing which was run in lieu of NAPLAN testing this year. I was very proud of the Year 9's mature approach to this new testing format and look forward to reviewing their achievement later on in the year. OLNA testing for Year 10, 11 and 12 students is drawing to a conclusion. Achievement of a Category 3 for Reading, Writing and Numeracy is required for students to achieve a WACE at the end of year 12. Year 12 exams are running during Week 10 and we wish all our ATAR students the very best in this final preparation for their final exams in November.

Student Council elections were held on the 27 August and I would like to congratulate all students who were successful in being selected for the Student Council. I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate the Prefects for 2021. We have a tremendous group of young people leading the student body and I wish them every success in their leadership roles.

Student excursions have resumed and students have participated in a range of offsite activities. The Shooting Stars have participated in a Netball camp in Meekatharra and a Junior Leadership camp in Broome which has resulted in a growing sense of confidence within our Aboriginal girls. A reward excursion is planned for Week 10. The Science Learning Area has been busy with Year 9 students participating in the Toolibin Science excursion and Year 10 & 11 Physics students exploring Physics at Adventure World. Year 11 Geography students spent a day in Perth doing Fieldwork. The Year 11 and 12 Building and Construction students worked with a local builder to build a retaining wall in the school grounds as part of their practical work.

As the term draws to a close, our Year 12 students are preparing to complete their formal schooling. Year 12 statements of results are currently being finalised and, for those students who are not sitting exams, there is little time left to submit those final pieces of work and complete courses and certificates. A big thank you to all our staff who have supported our students in becoming competent young adults who are fully equipped to face the world after school. This is a closing chapter for the Year 12 students and the beginning of a bright and exciting future. I am looking forward to the Year 12 Farewell Dinner and then seeing all of the students at our Presentation Night on the 23 October 2020. This is truly a celebration for staff, students and parents and is the culmination of years of hard work. The last day for Year 12 General students is the 19 October. ATAR students are expected to attend school until the 29 October where teachers will be preparing students for their final exams. ATAR students must wear school uniform and will be required to sign in and out of school on their arrival and departure.

As the school holidays approach I trust that staff and students will have a refreshing break and return safely next term, hopefully to some warmer weather.

Workplace Learning at NSHS

T his year 54 Yr 11 and Yr 12 students at Narrogin SHS have been engaged in Workplace Learning organised through the school. Students are placed in varying work places throughout the Region. Some attend one day a week, others in weekly blocks. Some do it as part of their School Based Traineeship, or their School Based Pre Apprenticeship, as it is a requirement of their Certificate Course and others do it independently to investigate what a particular career path might be like or as a trial for an apprenticeship for example. We also have a number of students who have had their causal paid work approved as Work Placement. All students recorded hours may count towards the achievement of their WACE if they complete the required Logbook and Skills Journal.

Year 9 Toolibin Excursion

The Year 9 Science classes have been learning about Eco-systems this term so to enhance their understanding they attended the Lake Toolibin Field Trip.

Students participated in five different activities. They used field keys to identify eight plants for plant bingo and the first group to fully complete their card won.

They also examined scats and tracks and identified different types of organisms that live at Toolibin Lake. They found evidence of echidnas, kangaroos, possums, foxes and spiders.

Spotting local bird life was also enjoyed and students managed to spot red capped robins, white brow babblers, Tawney Helmeted Homey Eaters, Dusky Wood Swallows, Mistletoe bird, Pardalote and the Restless fly catcher.






Maria Lee from Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attraction spoke to each group about the ecological significance of Toolibin. It is the last remaining fresh lake in the Wheatbelt. Students examined groundwater pumps and measured the depth of ground water under the lake, which was 12 meters below the surface.

This year we were privileged to have Mr Francis Bolton who shared his Noongar cultural knowledge with the student. He brought along his didgeridoos and tapping sticks and shared

his knowledge of how native plants can be used for bush tucker and for used for healing purposes. Having really enjoyed the activities the students kept gravitating back to Mr Bolton and his cultural tools.
