Lower School Social "Through the Decades"




"Through the Decades" was the theme for the end of term reward; a social for Year 7-10 students who were in Good Standing.

This social event began much earlier in the day with many of the school councillors and teachers volunteering their time to set up the Performing Arts Centre into a venue with a party feel.


With the greeters in place, the sausages cooked in the 1980's 'new romantic' way and given approval by a couple of 1960's hippies, the stars began to arrive.

Senior school is a time for looking forward to opportunities and adventures, balancing commitments to learning, study and assessments with the demands of being a young adult (or a big kid) in the modern world, and occasionally looking back at just how far we have all come since those first days of high school. Students have received their Semester One Reports, which are accessible on Connect or as a hard copy by request. I encourage students to critically evaluate their own performance, using teacher comments and feedback to identify their strengths and weaknesses, and set goals for future achievement. As Senior School courses are year-long, Semester One grades are indicative of progress only; it is the end of year grade that will be recorded on the Statement of Student Achievement and contribute to the WACE.

The Year 11 focus for Term Two was Transferable Skills; those valuable life skills, learned alongside curriculum content, that make students stand out to future employers and continue to thrive in an ever changing world of work. These include interpersonal skills, teamwork, resilience and self-care, as well as initiative, organisation and problem solving.

Year 12 students have been making a difference in their community, with active citizenship projects focusing on the United Nations Sustainability Goals. Engaging in advocacy activities to address issues like gender equality, quality education for all, and ending poverty and hunger, students have raised awareness and made meaningful contributions, such as volunteering at breakfast club.

Careers Week was held in Week Five, with career exploration activities, a free dress day to get students thinking about the range of careers they may work towards and a range of advocacy activities, career focus videos in each lesson. A focus on careers builds motivation and meaning into the learning that students do, both at school and beyond. The future of work will be dynamic and exciting, with endless possibilities and pathways, fewer 'traditional' work arrangements and careers that do not exist yet. Associate Principal - Middle School Maxine Clark Reading Your Child's Report



The end of the semester provides us all an opportunity to reflect on the progress our students have made on their unique learning journey. Achievement grades have been finalised and reports are available on Connect. If you have difficulty accessing reports please contact the school to help you obtain a copy.

The thought of parents and carers accessing reports brings mixed feelings for our students. Students may wonder if their parents will be proud or disappointed, many may place pressure on themselves, whilst others will be happy to achieve a pass. The importance students place on reports often depends on how parents and carers view reports. Reports provide a wealth of information on your child's study habits, work ethic, problems solving skills, ability to work in a team, their achieved, and how they can improve. It is important that you set time aside to go through your child's report with them. Select a time when everyone is in a good frame of mind.

Here are a few thing to keep in mind when reading the report.

Firstly, are your expectations in line with your child' ability; too high and your child might switch off, too low they will not strive to achieve their best. Try to avoid making comparisons with brothers, sisters or friends. Remember, all students progress at their own rate.

Self-esteem plays an enormous role in how students progress. Always be as positive as possible and focus on strengths. When reading their reports, the attributes are often more important than the achievement grade. Effort and attitude are key indicators of success. How your child gets along with their peers will influence their happiness and well-being in the future. Teamwork and problem-solving skills are highly valued by employers.

If your child is trying their best, congratulate them. If not, explain the importance of attitude and effort, and that success is more often linked to hard work.

Remember to ask them what they think about their progress, listen carefully to their concerns and encourage them to reflect on the teacher's suggestions for improvement. Most importantly, when you have finished reading and discussing the report, celebrate your child's successes and efforts. Happy reading.

Positive Behaviour News

Our Positive Behaviour focus for Term 3 is Respect; following instructions and Tolerance; accepting everyone is different. Staff will be explicitly modelling, teaching and acknowledging reflects these school wide expectations.

Our focus will be on students listening intently for staff instructions at the beginning of lessons and during key transition times. Staff will also concentrate on celebrating students' differences including strengths and weakness, gender and religious diversity, and cultural variations.

Vivo points will be awarded to students who demonstrate these expectations. Reward activities are planned for week 4 and a school social will occur week 8. Stay tuned for more information closer to these dates.

Uniforms

Narrogin Senior High School's core expectations are Respect, Responsibility and Tolerance. Our students demonstrate Respect when they wear our school uniform.

There are a myriad of advantages of wearing a school uniform for students, staff and parents. The wearing of uniforms can improve school connectedness, reduce bullying, increases safety, reduce costs and improve discipline.

The Narrogin Senior High School uniform for Years 7-9 students is a green with white sides unisex or fitted polo, black skirt or cargo shorts, black cuffed shorts Cargo pants, stretch bootleg pants, black track pants no logo, Narrogin Senior High School Jacket/Rugby Jumper.

The uniform for Year 10-12 students is a white with green sides unisex or fitted polo shirt, black skirt cargo shorts, black cuffed shorts, cargo pants, black track pants, Narrogin Senior High School Rugby Jumper/ Jacket. Uniform is available for purchase from Narrogin SportsPower.

Also please note that all students are required to wear predominantly black closed in shoes. All students should be wearing the school polo shirt. On cool days white or black long or short sleeved T shirts may be worn under the polo shirt and the jacket is really warm.

Students unable to wear the correct uniform on a particular day need to present to their Advocacy Teacher to collect an Out of Uniform card.

Students not wearing the school uniform will be approached by staff and asked to show their Out of Uniform card. If a student does not have an Out of Uniform card staff will direct them to Student Services or issue them with one. This will be recorded as a breach of school policy and, Parents and Carers will receive a text notification. If you receive a notification we would appreciate your support in assisting us to ensure your child meets the expectations of Narrogin Senior High School. Please contact Students Services for help if you are having difficulty obtaining uniform.

Students wearing hoodies will be instructed to remove them. A jacket/rugby jumper may be available from the Student Services Wing to wear for the day.

If you have uniforms at home that you no longer require, Student Services would appreciate any donation of uniforms. Thank you for your support in this matter.
