## WA Farmers Boot Camp to Employment

On the holidays I travelled to Northam to attend the WA Farmers Boot camp to employment, which was a three-day course held at the Muresk institute.

By the end of the course myself and seventeen others were given the opportunity to meet potential future employers who were looking for young and enthusiastic people to join their business and be involved within the agricultural industry.

The course mainly consisted of key note speakers talking to us about what they do to help farmers improve their practices on the farm as well as looking at machinery outside on the oval. It was great listening to them because it broadened my spectrum of the industry and really opened my eyes and allowed me to see what other practices and machinery are currently being used. The scary part is that in comparison to the size of the industry we didn't even scratch the surface, and in my opinion a course like this could go on for a week and never repeat itself. It goes to show how huge the agricultural industry is, in Australia currently the agricultural industry accounts for over 55% of the total land use; and there are so many different aspects involved leading to a wide range of jobs. Some highlights from the course would be listening to Simon Foley who is the general manager for Agworld, a farm data management system. He encouraged us to place ourselves at the point of change which will allow us to be highly employable and sought after within the industry.

My other highlight was being offered a potential traineeship with Boekeman Machinery and having the opportunity to work in the sales and precision agricultural side of their business. It was such an amazing experience; not only did I get to meet other people, who like me have an interest in agriculture, but I also had the opportunity to gain new contacts within the industry. I strongly recommend this course to people who are thinking of entering the agricultural industry. The people who run it are very supportive even if you decide to not continue with an agricultural future as the course is about exposing people to what it will be like within the industry.

### Good Standing Policy

The schools Good Standing Policy has been amended to accommodate the DOEWA Requirements related to Student Behaviour in Public Schools policy, relating to suspensions.

Related to Page 7 of 44 in above policy :

Guidance A loss of good standing in a school is a sanction imposed as a result of a serious breach of discipline, whereby the student will not be permitted to participate in specific school events. Where a loss of good standing has been imposed, the principal will continue to provide supervision and appropriate educational instruction to students not permitted to take part in school events. A student's good standing can be re-instated over such a period decided by the principal and should be outlined in the student's re-entry plan or behaviour support plan.

We are working hard to have a clear and simple process for Good Standing that is complemented by the ViVOs rewards program and the Positive Behaviour in Schools (PBS) program.

**The PBS committee** are looking at identifying themes to address behaviours we would like to encourage and see, the student council have also been involved in developing this. Kindness is the upcoming theme with lessons throughout the school that demonstrate what this looks like throughout the school.

**NSHS Band Performance** at recent WA Orchestra and Band Festival are congratulated for their achievement – they were awarded Outstanding (highest accolade possible) in B Division for their performance. Huge congratulations to Mr Howieson and Ms Armstrong with the support of Ms Edwards for their passion and inspiring the musical performances of our school band.



**Careers expo** there are 2 opportunities for students to attend Career expos. 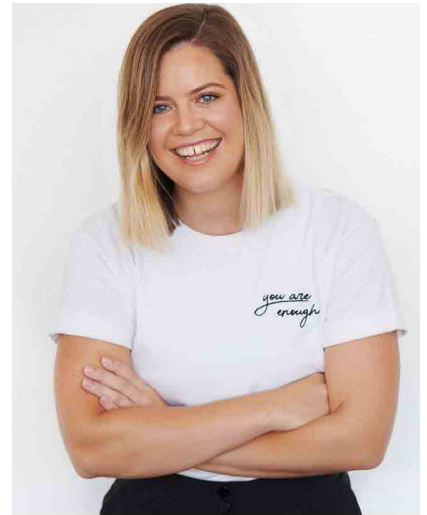

# Certificates Achieved in Academic Excellence

Previously the student would be provided with an award for 8 A's. Due to timetable changes the number of subjects have altered which makes it extremely difficult to achieve 8 A's in Years 7 to 10 within a semester report. So, with some consideration, Narrogin SHS have looked at Grade Point Averages – mainly as the formula remains constant throughout any changes to the timetable with A's equalling 5 points, a B grade equals 4 points, a C grade equals 3 points, a D grade equals 2 points and an E grade equals 1 point.

Any student above or equal to a GPA of 4.75 has illustrated academic excellence by achieving A in at least 75% of their grades. This has replaced the 8 A's Award.

# Supporting Young People in the Southern Wheatbelt

According to the WA Country Health Service's Child and Maternal Health Profile 2017, young people living in the country face more challenges compared to their counterparts in the city.

Holyoake's Wheatbelt Community Alcohol & Drug Service (WCADS) Prevention Team is committed to addressing this issue with a range of initiatives. This includes the Youth Early Intervention Program (YEIP) which is funded by the Alcohol & Drug Foundation as part of their Local Drug Action Team program.

The YEIP aims to support young people in the southern Wheatbelt to minimise the use of alcohol and other drugs (AOD), to increase awareness of AOD and mental health services, and to promote involvement in activities that reduce social isolation and improve mental health and wellbeing.

The WCADS Prevention Team (Jo Woodruff & Jo Drayton), along with Jess Daniels (AHPA Scholarship recipient), have recently facilitated several information sessions at Narrogin Senior High School. They introduced the Within Your Wallet initiative and presented students with free wallet cards which are designed for young people aged 11-18 living in the southern Wheatbelt. The WCADS Prevention Team have also presented to students at WA College of Agriculture (Narrogin), Boddington District High School, Brookton District High School, and Wagin District High School.

The wallet card is designed to fit in a pocket, wallet, on the fridge or tucked in a phone case. It features a list of websites, helplines and chat lines for reliable information and support on alcohol, drugs, mental health and wellbeing. The card also includes 2 QR codes; one links to the Within REACH Instagram page which offers youth-specific, evidence-based information on mental health, study skills, sexual health, alcohol and illicit drugs, career pathways and cybersafety. The second QR code links to a digital calendar of youth events and activities in the region; it provides information on dates, times, venue, costs, and the age groups the program is suitable for.

The wallet card can also be used to access a range of activities and events in the digital calendar at no cost. These include free swims, use of pool inflatables, basketball and squash court hire, free wifi at Community Resource Centres, group fitness classes (15+ years), and gym sessions (16+ years). Regular use of the card for these programs could result in savings of over \$100.

If you have misplaced your wallet card, replacements can be accessed from the Administration Office, Students Services or from Brendan at the Y.

The team is also keen to provide more opportunities to support young people in the region so please email any suggestions and feedback to the Prevention Team on the email address below. 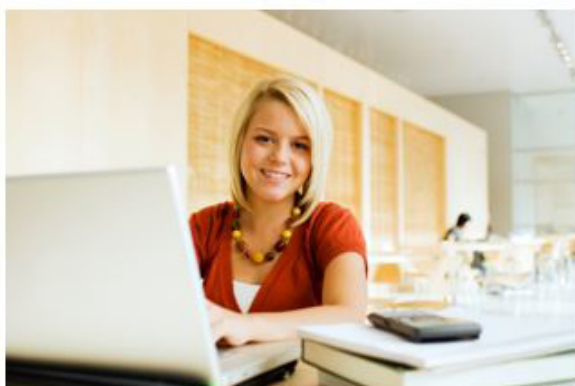
