






Elections Come to NSHS

One of Narrogin Senior High School's key priorities is to establish an orderly environment. At Narrogin Senior High School, we focus on teaching our core values of Respect, Tolerance and Responsibility to establish clear expectations around behaviours that reflect our values. Clear and consistent expectations promote the development of an inclusive, accepting culture where students and staff feel safe and valued. When teachers and students feel safe, they are able to focus on teaching and learning. This has a positive impact on student achievement and teacher performance.

It is essential we all work together to achieve an orderly environment. Narrogin Senior High School's Behaviour Matrix explicitly sets out what Respectful, Tolerant and Responsible behaviour looks like in different contexts around our school. To reinforce expected behaviours, staff acknowledge students by awarding VIVO points.

At times students will display behaviour that does not reflect our core expectations and this is seen as an opportunity to teach students how to regulate their behaviour. Sometimes students will be given consequences that they may not seem fair. In these situations, please encourage your child to find a time to have a private and respectful conversation with staff in regards to their concerns. It is important to remember that staff need to consider and balance the needs of both the individual student and the whole school. Sometimes the needs of an individual student may conflict with the needs of the class. Staff are constantly trying to achieve a balance between individual and group rights.

If you have a concern, please contact the school to discuss the issue. Remember if it is in a particular Learning Area contact the appropriate HoLA, if it is a general concern your Child's Advocacy Teacher or Year Coordinator is the best point of contact. It is the responsibility of all of us to ensure these conversations remain polite and respectful.

This week I have been talking to Year Groups, and reminding students that when they enrolled at Narrogin Senior High School, they agreed to abide by the school's Code of Conduct. Recently we have had an increase in mobile incidents at school. All students have signed an agreement stating phones are off and away all day. Please remind your child to abide by our mobile phone agreement. Staff have been instructed to remove phones when they see them. I thank you for your continued support to ensure we have an orderly environment to optimise learning for all students.










Harry Perkins Biotechnology **Excursion**



ear 12 Biology and Human Biology students were up for **L** an early start on Friday 20th August to go to the Harry Perkins Institute for Biomedical Research. This was a fantastic opportunity for students to put their learning into practice and use the proper research lab facilities to investigate a gene of interest.


The students combined their knowledge of lab techniques such as PCR and Gel Electrophoresis to investigate a mutation in a gene which causes a heightened risk for melanoma. Using the proper pipettes and lab equipment was an experience that will prepare the students well for their laboratory studies at University. Students were also shown around the facilities by PhD students, with one of the highlights being the 'green room' which messed with our colour perception and made the white walls appear pink on exiting!

All students completed the practical successfully with no contamination and one of our NSHS groups got the top score on the PCR game. We definitely have some candidates for future research scientists within our midst!



ATAR Biology

Vegetation survey

Year 11 ATAR Biology students conducted fieldwork with Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions staff to monitor the populations of endangered and threatened species of plants and animals within the Dryandra Woodland.

Students learned how Parks and Wildlife use fire to encourage growth and regeneration, and used techniques for monitoring the short and long term effects of fire on plants and animals.

We ended our trip off with a relaxing 5km walk down Ochre trail, and hot dogs for lunch before saying goodbye to the Mandurah students.

Overall the trip was an incredible adventure, a very educational experience, and a great bonding moment that I don't think any of us will be forgetting any time soon... especially Mr Daley.

T he semi-finals of the peak hockey tournament for boys in WA was played by the school on the 23 August. Our results were:


- Shenton College 3-0 loss


