Year 9 Career Taster Program

Shearing Industry Insight with Rob Carter

Today Rob visited our school to perform and teach the Year 9 class about the shearing industry. We were presented with three beautiful Suffolk/Merino cross breeds.



These sheep were nicely shorn by Rob who has been working in this industry for around 20 years. He started by shearing the belly fleece first because it is the closest part to the ground and most likely to have grass seeds, he shored the crutch second removing the dags and urine that damage the grade of the fleece, he then proceeded to move along the back and finally let the sheep back into its pen.

The wool from the ewe (female) had a slight colour difference than the wether (male), this would not be noticed as easily without a classer. In the shearing industry there are many roles that take place, from the farmer to contractor all the way to the shearer, wool handlers, presser and of course the sheep dogs.



The wool gets separated and categorised by the grade of how it is shorn, 100% of the wool can be used, and even the dags can be made into dark stained t-shirts or jumpers. Many of the higher-grade wool can be used to make tailored suits and dresses. The fribs are made from the sweat and wool grease of the sheep and can be used in beauty products such as moisturiser.



Protective gear in the shearing industry is dependent on the weather conditions but enclosed shoes must be worn, the shearers must wear a special type of shoe called moccasins which are made of leather with no soles which protect them from hurting their ankles as well as the sheep themselves.

The typical shearing seasons are often all year round and can be shorn all over the world, but the main seasons are during august to December which are best months to avoid grass seeds. Shearers can shear around 140 sheep per day, but some do more, and some do less, this depends on the sheep and environment.

The technology has changed a lot since the use of clippers, shearers now use the Heiniger Evo shearing plants with an electric safety switch that helps eliminate hand piece lockup.

Students and people who are interested can become learners in the shearing sheds, starting from wool handling and slowly making their way up to shearing full time.



Advance with Integrity | Responsibility Respect Tolerance

The PBS team are working steadily towards finalising the revised Behaviour Matrix for 2023 and developing PBS lessons for delivery to students through Extended Advocacy classes. We would like to share with you our Term 4 focus and our planning for 2023.

PBS: Current Focus

Our weekly PBS focus is published in our Daily Notices. We use behaviour data to identify our targeted behaviours. Staff behaviour infringement information, collected through Compass entries, suggest that students are using their personal electronic devices in class and around the school, taking the long way to class or roaming during class time, as well as allowing personal, emotional and relationship issues to interfere with their classroom learning.

Our PBS lesson focus in Week 5 of Term 4, will be on teaching students to take toilet breaks at break time, stay in the classroom, focus on learning and put distractions aside. Please support us by checking in with your child to see if any of these issues are behaviours they need to relearn.

School Diaries

At NSHS, all students are encouraged to use a school diary. Diaries are important tools that allow us to keep our information organised. Homework can be recorded here and assessments planned, with due dates noted so work can be completed in time for assignment submission.

In 2023, a copy of the Behaviour Matrix will be included in our official school diary. This will remind students about our school's behavioural expectations. When our school diary is on your child's booklist, please purchase it for them.

Behaviour Matrix Available in all Classrooms

A laminated copy of our Behaviour Matrix is displayed in all classrooms throughout the school. This is our document; we created it - from parent, staff and student feedback. In 2023, our PBS lessons will explore each revised expectation on our revised Behaviour Matrix.

But for now, please remind your child to do the following:

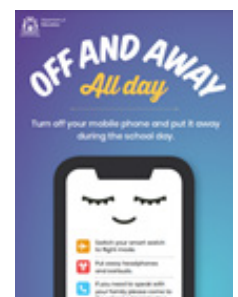
- Personal devices off and away all day
- Take toilet breaks at break time
- Focus on learning and keep distractions aside.

VIVO Points

An end of year Rewards Day is being planned by the Student Services team. Does your child have enough VIVO points to redeem?

Staff are awarding VIVO points to students whose phones are off and away all day; who take toilet breaks at break time and who focus on learning and keep distractions aside. Other behaviours as stated on our Matrix will be rewarded with VIVOs too.

Please encourage your child to regularly demonstrate the desired behaviours of Respect, Responsibility and Tolerance, so that they can earn VIVO points and use them to participate in our reward activities. Student Services will ask students to sign up for their preferred reward activity towards the end of term. Be ready – gather VIVO points!

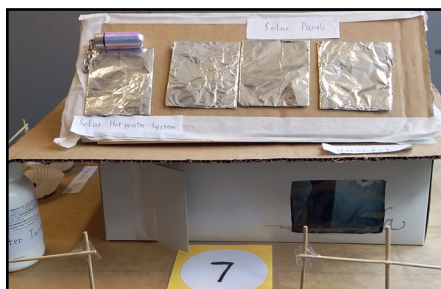

This year I embarked on a new teaching and learning journey following my acceptance into the LEAP course provided by the Department of Education to study the Indonesian language and teaching pedagogies to extend my capacity as a teacher at Narrogin SHS.

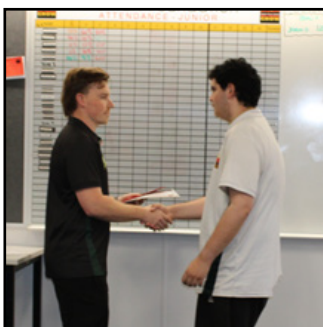

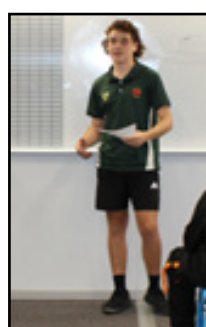

The Facts About Vaping

Do you know what they're vaping?

Narrogin Senior High School, like many other schools, has seen a recent increase in young people vaping.

Electronic cigarettes or e-cigarettes, often called 'vapes', are electronic devices designed to deliver vapourised liquids into the lungs. There are many different styles of vapes and types of e-liquids, or e-juices, available. Vapes come in many shapes and sizes and can be made to look like everyday items including highlighters, pens or USB memory sticks.

The biggest misunderstanding about vapes is that they are harmless compared to cigarettes. This is not true. Vapes are not safe.

Vaping facts

- Many vapes contain nicotine making them very addictive.
- The nicotine in 1 vape can equal 50 cigarettes.
- Vapes can contain the same harmful chemicals found in cleaning products, nail polish remover, weed killer and bug spray. They just don't put it on the pack.
- Vapes can leave young people at increased risk of depression and anxiety.
- Young people who vape are 3 times as likely to take up smoking cigarettes.
- Vape aerosol is not water vapour.
- Vaping has been linked to serious lung disease.
- Vapes that contain nicotine can cause long-lasting negative effects on young people's brain development.

Signs your child might be vaping

Tell-tale signs that your child might have started vaping include the symptoms of nicotine addiction such as feeling irritable or anxious.

The laws around selling vapes

It is reported that young people often purchase vapes online, from retail stores or from friends and contacts in the community. However, it is illegal in WA to sell e-cigarette devices and nicotine vaping products to anyone regardless of age, unless they are prescribed by a doctor for smoking cessation purposes and obtained with a prescription from a pharmacy.

In WA e-cigarette devices and their components, whether they contain nicotine or not, cannot be sold by tobacco or general retailers. If you suspect someone is selling vapes or e-cigarettes and their components, you can report it to the Department of Health by emailing TobaccoPolicy@health.wa.gov.au

Talk to your child about vaping

Whether you suspect your child is vaping or not, take the time to talk to them about vaping and help them understand the risks. Try to start the conversation in a relaxed easy-going way, be patient, and remember your goal is to have a conversation, not deliver a lecture. Importantly, have your facts ready.

THE FACTS ABOUT VAPING

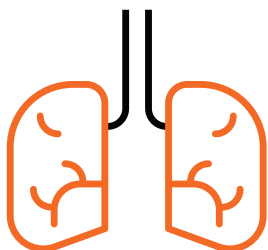
