Pathways and Opportunities 2025 - Wendy Sargeantson

They shared information about career pathways and planning for a future beyond high school. Of relevance to our community at this time, was the discussion around the clean energy industry and the potential for employment within the sustainable agriculture sector.

In addition to the Trade Training Centre providing this year's Career Conversations event with an ideal venue, a delicious light supper was also prepared by the students and staff at the Hilltop Café which was greatly enjoyed by all.

We are incredibly grateful to the MAN UP team for sparking important conversations and helping shape the next generation of young men with courage and compassion.





ith the purpose of giving students an insight into life at university, Gemma and Andy most certainly demonstrated that they know how to put the fun into learning. Across the day, almost 100 students had a chance to participate in the workshops, presentations and one-to-one university guidance counselling sessions.

7Sci_1 were given 'The Rube Goldberg Challenge' workshop where they worked in teams to design and build a working Rube Goldberg Machine within set constraints and a limited time.







9Sci_1 had a genetic challenge for their task while participating in the 'All Sheep and Sizes' workshop. In this game students had to use their knowledge of genetics to 'breed' successive generations of sheep to enhance the desirable traits and minimise the undesirable ones, in order to produce optimal offspring.









10DC_3 got to use AI for good in the 'How to Talk to Computers' workshop. During this session they learnt about the power of GenAI to generate text, images and even modify sound records, but perhaps most importantly, they also considered the ethics of using AI too.

Year 10 Advocacy were given a presentation which explored the multitude of different ways that they could follow to get to university. They learnt that ATAR is definitely not the only way to achieve the university dream.



Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC) 2025 - David Fung

In early August, 92 students from Narrogin Senior High School took part in the Australian Mathematics Competition, run by the Australian Mathematics Trust.

This event invites students from Years 3 to 12 across Australia and their equivalent grades overseas to put their problem solving skills to the test.

During the competition, students worked through 30 increasingly challenging problems in 75 minutes, applying logic and mathematical reasoning under pressure.

The Year 9 Career Taster Program aims to inspire our students to become 'career curious' about further study opportunities and potential careers. This year the school was lucky to partner with South Regional TAFE and so were able to access Department of Training and Workforce Development funding to put on a whole day of activities.

On site, groups of Year 9 students rotated through a variety of industry-led experiences. On the oval, from South Regional TAFE Narrogin's Campus we had Rob Carter presenting shearing and Sensr Solutions demonstrating drones. In the Performing Arts Centre, Mindflight provided career information and experiences through virtual immersion and VR7. In addition, our trade training team introduced groups of students to vocational education and the potential for starting a career in hospitality while still at school.

During the morning, Ms Seery took a group of students on an excursion to the TAFE campus and to REED to discover the essential training and work roles required of staff in a childcare environment.

Brad Harkup from Sensr Solutions demonstrated how drones could be used in a wide variety of industries, including on construction sites, mining and quarrying, in agriculture, cartography, film and television, and assisting in search and rescue emergencies.









Meanwhile in the PAC, Mindflight took groups on a virtual tour where our students were able to explore a variety of careers without ever having to get off their chairs.

What To Do if your child is bullied online?

Bullying online is when someone repeatedly uses the internet to be mean to another person.

If the content has been shared on a public platform such as social media, it can be seen and spread quickly by large numbers of students. It can happen anytime of day where the child being bullied has access to a digital device.

This often makes the child feel overwhelmed and powerless, and can cause severe mental harm to the victim.

Some examples of cyberbullying include:

- sending hurtful or abusive messages
- spreading nasty rumours or lies about someone
- creating fake accounts in someone's name to embarrass them or to cause drama by sending nasty messages to their friends
- sharing photos or videos of someone to make fun of them or humiliate them
- 'trolling' people (posting or commenting online to provoke an argument or emotional reaction)

A number of students have reported being cyberbullied, whilst staff support the students and provide them with protective strategies, these events often occur at home.


It is important that hurtful content is removed as quickly as possible. The eSafety Commissioner is a useful site to locate information for parents to support their children in this situation. The first thing is to contact the site used and ask for the content to be removed.


